Useless- turns out they fog up almost immediately. So do goggles, by the way but at least you can take them off and squint through the rain while your passenger wipes the lenses off For for you. Stingray/Thunderbird/Chopped-Merc/'57 Chevy crowd, life is easy. For us brass horseless-carriage drivers, it's an effort-and sometimes, it's an ordeal fraught with hazard. Why put ourselves through all that? Why? Because BRASS RULES! That's why.

Yeah, when I was a kid, if you were talking antique cars, you meant Brass & Gas and wooden-spoked wheels, because nothing else was old enough to qualify. I'm usually the only Brass-Era driver in attendance. Still, at any car show, the uniqueness and incongruous anachronism of my humble '15 Model T Ford always makes it a big hit with spectators. At red traffic lights, people roll down their windows and ask the inevitable questions, "What year is that? How fast can it go?" Pedestrians stop in their tracks, raise their cell-phone cameras, and take pictures. Oh, they just love it when I invite them to climb aboard and pose for snapshots in the car and sound the ahooga horn. And when I offer them a ride, they're absolutely overcome with delight.

Like I said, BRASS RULES!
